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School choice and careers – occupation profiles in 2021 of males and females who attended Government, Catholic and Other Independent secondary schools in 2011

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School choice and career profiles

Does attending a non-government secondary school give you an advantage in choice of career in later life?

This study examines the occupations held in 2021 by the sex of the person and the sector of secondary school (Government run, Catholic, Other Independent) attended in 2011.

Starting in 2006 the Australian Bureau of Statistics began linking a sample of Census returns for individuals with their Census data in later years. The linked data is held in a series of Longitudinal Census databases. In this study we have looked at people who were attending secondary school full time in 2011 at either a government run, Catholic or other independent school. For each cohort we have then looked at their employment profile in 2021.

The study has focused on answering three questions:

- Does the sector of the secondary school attended and the sex of the student vary the pattern of engagement in the labour force?
- Does the skill level in the job held in 2021 vary by the sector of the secondary school attended and the sex of the student?
- Are there skews in the occupation patterns by industry associated with sector of school attended and sex of the student?

Key findings

Engagement in the labour force

In 2021 students who had attended Catholic secondary schools in 2011 had the highest levels of employment – 87% of females and 85% of males were employed either full time, part-time or employed away from work.

In contrast the lowest rate of engagement in employment was 79% for both males and females who had previously attended government run secondary schools.

Skill levels of jobs held

The ABS classify all occupations into one of five skill levels. They are:

- **Skill Level 1:** Jobs which require at least five years relevant experience or a bachelor's degree or higher qualification
- **Skill Level 2:** Jobs that need at least three years relevant experience and/or Associate Degree, Advanced Diploma or Diploma
- **Skill Level 3:** Jobs needing at least 2 years on-the-job training and a Certificate III or IV, or at least 3 years of relevant experience
- **Skill Level 4:** Jobs require a Certificate II or III qualification, or at least one year of relevant experience
- **Skill Level 5:** No post school qualifications required, may require short period of on-the-job training

Table 2 below shows the percentage of each sex/school sector cohort by skill level of job held in 2021.

Females who attended other independent secondary schools had the highest proportion in Skill level 1 jobs (41%) across both genders, with the lowest proportion across both genders (18%) for males who attended government run secondary schools.

Under the recent University Accord the government and universities in Australia have committed to a target of 80% of people of workforce age having a post-secondary qualification by 2050.²

The Australian Universities Accord Summary report states:

Jobs and Skills Australia (JSA) anticipates that over the next decade more than 90% of new jobs will require post-school qualifications. This includes around 50% requiring bachelor degree or higher qualifications and 44% requiring VET qualifications ³ Further, evidence prepared for the Review by Oxford Economics Australia suggests that 90% of 25 to 34-year-olds will require a tertiary education by 2050 ¹⁴

With 50% of 90% of new jobs (45% of all new jobs) requiring bachelor degree or higher qualifications we can identify the gap between current qualification levels and the Accord target by school sector of 45% with bachelor or higher degree qualifications.

In the absence of key initiatives to address the low level of engagement in post compulsory education for males in the government and Catholic run school sectors it is difficult to see how the Accord targets will be met.

The current performance of 24% for males attending government secondary schools will need to almost double to achieve the target. In only 1 region (ACT) was the performance of government schools above target, and this was only for female students.

In contrast females who attended other independent schools have exceeded the government's 45% target for 2050 in every state and territory. Males who attended independent other schools have exceeded the target in NSW, ACT and VIC, but are below target in all other states.

The data is this study highlights the educational attainment gap for males, in particular for males receiving education in government run secondary schools.

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Employment patterns in selected occupations and industries

Where occupations require university training for entry, and there is more demand for courses than there are available places, there is a strong and significant over-representation of people in these occupations who attended other independent schools in 2011.

For example, in the health sector females who attended other independent schools in 2011 were over-represented:

- 3.13 times for General Practitioners and Resident Medical Officers
- 3.06 times for Psychologists
- 2.88 times for Nutrition Professionals
- 2.39 times for Audiologists and Speech Pathologists\Therapists
- 2.38 times for Occupational Therapists
- 2.31 times for Other Medical Practitioners

In contrast males who attended government run secondary schools in 2011 were under-represented in these health industry occupations:

- 35% fewer than expected holding jobs as General Practitioners and Resident Medical Officers
- 73% fewer Psychologists
- 84% fewer Audiologists and Speech Pathologists\Therapists
- 94% fewer Occupational Therapists
- 43% fewer Other Medical Practitioners

Selective entry government schools – do they reduce the bias in employment?

Given the strong level of over-representation of former secondary students attending other independent schools in medical practitioner occupations, does this apply equally across all states and territories in Australia?

To study this question it was necessary to group together states and territories with smaller populations (ACT, NT, SA, WA, TAS), while there was sufficient data to analyse results for NSW, VIC and QLD independently.

The results of this analysis are shown in Table 4 below. To produce this table we have first calculated the proportion of all students in all secondary schools in all states in 2011 who were medical practitioners in 2021 (0.6%).

Next, the proportion in each cohort (state/state group, sex, school sector) who were medical practitioners in 2021 was calculated. Finally, the cohort proportion was divided by the overall proportion (the index score).

If the index score is a value of 1 then this means that the proportion of the cohort that went on to become medical practitioners was aligned to the overall rate at which males and females from all school sectors qualified as doctors.

A value of 0.5 means that people in that cohort were only half as likely to gain an occupation as medical practitioner compared to the overall population rate.

In Table 4 above we can see that the performance of government secondary schools in NSW is significantly higher than that achieved in other states — close to double the performance of Victorian government run secondary schools for both males and females.

Why? One possibility is the structure of the government run school sector in NSW.

NSW appears to have the most comprehensive selective entry secondary schools of any state or territory in Australia, with 47 selective entry schools.⁵ In contrast, Victoria has only 4 selective entry secondary schools, ⁶ while there are 3 in Queensland and 1 in WA, with no government run selective entry schools in any other state or territory in Australia.⁷

The provision of selective entry schools run by the government appears to reduce the skew towards students from other independent schools being highly over-represented in highly sought after occupations.

Occupations in education

Table 5 below shows the employment index for a range of occupations in the education sector.

Males appear to have a lower level of engagement in both post compulsory education and also in employment in the education sector. This is most pronounced for males who attended government run secondary schools. This group has very low employment indexes in early childhood, primary and secondary teaching jobs.

In contrast, females who attended Catholic run secondary schools have the highest employment indexes for primary school teaching jobs (2.44 times the rate of the whole group studied), early childhood teaching (2.24 times the rate of the whole group studied), as well as the highest index for special education teachers (2.31).

Occupations in construction

Both the government and Catholic school sectors appear to provide strong pathways into occupations in the construction and house building industries for males. Table 6 below shows the occupation indexes for selected occupations in these industries. The full employment patterns for all occupations with employment counts of 500 or more are shown in the appendix of this report.

The occupation indexes provide a guide to the extent to which employment patterns vary from the rate at which the overall population have employment in a specific occupation. For example, if 1 % of the workforce were employed as plumbers and 2.5% of males who attended government schools in 2011 were plumbers in 2021 then the employment index for this group would be 2.5

We can see from Table 6 that male students who attended Catholic secondary school have an index of 2.42, meaning that they are 2.42 times more likely to be plumbers than the general rate across all student/sex cohorts.

Industries worked in by school sector and sex of student

For each sex/school cohort counts were developed for the number of people in each industry group using the two digit ANZSIC classification. Total counts were generated for males and females in each industry group. There are a total of 105 separate industries at the two digit level. Of these there were 88 industries where there was a total of at least 500 workers across the sex/school cohorts.

An overall rate of employment in each of the 88 industries was calculated for both males and females. Next the rate of employment in each industry group for each cohort was calculated. Finally an index was calculated (cohort rate/all in industry rate) to identify patterns of over and under representation in industries for different school cohorts.

The index scores allow an assessment of the extent to which specific school/sex cohorts are working in occupations across all industries, or if there are skews, having concentrated employment in some industries and limited employment in other industries.

Chart 1 below shows the pattern of engagement in different industries by sex and school sector attended in 2011. Under represented was determined to be at least 20% below the overall rate, while over represented was set at 20% or more above the overall rate.

It can be seen that females who attended other independent schools have the highest skews in industry representation – the greatest number of industries both under and over represented in, and the fewest with 'normal' distribution.

Why are females who attended independent secondary schools significantly under-represented in some industries, and at the same time significantly over-represented in other industries? It appears that both choice of occupation and industry worked in are shaped to some degree by the sector of secondary school attended.

In contrast to the cohorts who attended independent secondary schools, both males and females who attended government run secondary schools are much more uniformly spread in employment across different industries.




Chart 1: Depth of engagement across industry groups in Australia by sex and school sector attended in 2011

The high level of industry skews for females who attended other independent schools can be seen in Chart 1. Rather than a normal distribution of employment across all industry sectors, the females who attended other independent secondary schools are significantly over-represented in industries such as:

- Motion Picture and Video Production
- Motion Picture Exhibition
- Internet Publishing and Broadcasting
- Non-Store Retailing
- Health Care and Social Assistance, nfd
- Hospitals (except Psychiatric Hospitals)
- General Practice Medical Services
- Specialist Medical Services
- Physiotherapy Services
- Chiropractic and Osteopathic Services
- Other Allied Health Services
- Central Government Administration
- Central Banking
- Financial Asset Investing
- Air and Space Transport
- Airport Operations and Other Air Transport Support Services

Some of the industries in which they are significantly under-represented include:

- Defence
- Correctional and Detention Services
- Car Retailing
- Motor Vehicle Parts Retailing
- Supermarket and Grocery Stores
- Liquor Retailing
- Hardware and Building Supplies Retailing
- Gold Ore Mining
- Coal Mining
- Road Freight Transport
- Postal Services
- Freight Forwarding Services

It is quite likely that there will be a correlation between occupations held and industries worked in. For example, the occupation of General Practitioner will be associated with General Practice Medical Services. However, the industry grouping of General Practice Medical Services will also include other people (nursing staff, practice managers and receptionists) employed in general practice clinics.

The primary focus of the current research has been on occupations, rather than industry. However, given structural changes occurring in the Australian economy the relationship between sector of secondary school attended and industry worked in will merit further study.

Discussion

Three questions were posed at the beginning of this study:

- Does the sector of the secondary school attended and the sex of the student vary the pattern of engagement in the labour force?
- Does the skill level in the job held in 2021 vary by the sector of the secondary school attended and the sex of the student?
- Are there skews in the occupation patterns by industry associated with sector of school attended and sex of the student?

The longitudinal Census data allows tracking of the life patterns of individuals over time. It provides conclusive evidence that future engagement in the workforce, skill levels of jobs held and the specific occupations held by people post-secondary school differ. These differences vary depending on the state or territory in which a person receives their secondary education, and the sector of secondary school that they attended.

There is, however, a narrowing of differences in occupational profiles when state governments provide extensive selective-entry secondary schools. This suggests that more socially equitable outcomes may be achieved through an increased provision of selective-entry secondary schools across Australia.

It is important to note that in this study we have not established the causes of the observed differences in results across school sectors and states and territories. We only show correlations.

However, the magnitude of the observed differences is considerable. Given this, together with structural changes in our economy (driven by automation and off-shoring of jobs, as well as emerging trends in AI) it is critical that we find ways to better understand why we have these observed disparities on outcomes.

In turn, this raises questions:

- Is fiscal equalisation (equality of investment inputs) through the Grants Commission working as intended?
- Why do the current funding formulas for secondary school education deliver such unequal outcomes?
- What is the role of school culture and teaching methods in building engagement with post compulsory education?
- What 'compensation' or targeted interventions can school systems offer to students coming from families with little experience of post compulsory education?

With the increasing adoption of digital devices including smart phones at ever earlier ages, what does this do to attention spans and ability to learn formal skills? What is potentially needed in changes in curriculum and pedagogy to deal with the low levels of engagement with post compulsory education, particularly for males?

The sums of public money being committed to secondary and tertiary education are enormous yet until now the measures to evaluate effectiveness have primarily been within-system measures (NAPLAN tests and ATAR scores). But here we are extending the focus of evaluation of performance to track the real life outcomes experienced by students from different school sectors. Thus there is

now the opportunity to re-frame discussions and develop policies and funding methods that deliver greater engagement with post compulsory education as well as more equitable outcomes for Australian school students.

The development of longitudinal Census data allows a more comprehensive 'outcome' analysis of life patterns after attending different school sectors and receiving education in different states and territories.

This data allows outcomes to be assessed but does not identify the causal factors associated with differences in outcomes. Nevertheless, the outcomes detailed in this study are themselves suggestive of some hypotheses:

- Difficulties in thriving in early education may reduce engagement with education and interest in pursuing education beyond compulsory schooling.
- School culture and teaching styles may be critical in building and maintaining engagement in education. The performance of selective entry secondary schools in NSW indicates that an expansion of selective-entry schools in other states and territories may help to close the gap.
- School culture and ethics may play a role in the choice of careers taken up by former students. In particular the Catholic sector produces significantly more women working in 'caring' and health professions including midwifery, speech pathology and audiology, psychology, podiatry, special education teaching, nursing, early childhood teaching, counselling and work as nurse managers.

Conducting longitudinal research over a period of 15-20 years on actual patterns of student engagement and performance (attendance records, discipline issues, term reports, grade records throughout school years, etc.) would until recently have been an impossible task.

With the advent of generative AI we are now in a position to rethink how we analyse performance during school years. We can also use the power of AI to mine through vast amounts of school administrative data to build significantly improved models of at risk students, allowing targeted and effective interventions to improve students' engagement during their school years.

APPENDIX: The full employment patterns in 2021 by sex of student, state of residence and school sector attended in 2011

The tables below shows standardised rates of employment for each occupation and each cohort (sex of student, state of education and school sector used). The standardised rate first identifies the proportion of the whole population studied (people who were attending secondary school in 2011) in each occupation group in 2021. The proportion of individual cohorts in an occupation group is divided by the proportion of the whole population in the occupation group to provide an employment in occupation index. A value of 1 indicates parity with the overall population, while a value of 2 indicates that the cohort has twice the proportion of the overall population holding that occupation.

The occupation groups here use the Australian and New Zealand Standard Occupation Classification system. Occupations where there were fewer than 500 people recorded in the occupation have been excluded from the analysis. This is to avoid issues with randomisation of small data counts by the ABS in the production of data using Table Builder.

The data has been structured in eight tables. Each table has a count column, cohort description and employment in occupation index. The count column is the total count from all persons who were students in 2011 who held that job in 2021.

The eight tables are as follows:

- Table 7 Males by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes >=2. For all the occupations shown here for each male school cohort, the proportion of the school cohort in the occupation was at least twice the rate of the overall population.
- Table 8 Males by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes between 1.5 and 2.
- Table 9 Males by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes between 0.75 and <1.5
- Table 10 Males by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes below 0.75.
- Table 11 Females by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes >=2.
- Table 12 Females by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes between 1.5 and 2
- Table 13 Females by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes between 0.75 and <1.5
- Table 14 Females by school cohort with employment in occupation indexes below 0.75.
- Table 15: Counts in occupation group in 2021 across all sex/school cohorts

With the tables structured by skew of over/under representedness and by sex, it is possible to see patterns associated with different school cohorts. For example (from Table 10), some of the most over-represented occupations for females who attended government run secondary schools are housekeepers, domestic cleaners, beauty therapists and child care workers.

This is in contrast to females who attended Catholic run secondary schools who are most strongly over-represented in occupations such as midwives, nurses, primary school teachers and HR professionals. Females who attended other secondary schools are more over-represented in occupations such as interior designers, judicial and other legal professionals, GP's, psychologists, journalists and veterinarians.

Occupation patterns for males (in Table 6 above) show high levels of over-representation in construction trades such as paving and surfacing labourers, insulation and home improvement

installers, wall and floor tilers, plasterers, structural steel construction workers, glaziers, bricklayers and stonemasons and cabinet makers.

Males who attended catholic run secondary schools are over-represented in occupations such as chemical and materials engineering, precision metal trades workers, fire and emergency service workers, police officers and aircraft maintenance engineers.

Males who attended other independent secondary schools are more likely to have occupations of research and development managers, electronics engineers, financial dealers, chief executives and managing directors, ministers of religion and air transport professionals.
